A UNIQUE CENTRAL ASIA AND VIRGINIA BEACH CONNECTION IN PUBLIC HEALTH

Robert Campbell, Jr., PhD, MS is recent former HHS health scientist and Assistant Professor of Epidemiology at Eastern Virginia Medical School (EVMS), MPH Program. He's also a retired distinguished Air Force officer who completed tours in Afghanistan, Croatia, Germany Italy, Hungary, and Krygyzstan. He earned his PhD in Epidemiology and Biostatistics from Case Western Reserve University. His work focuses on health disparities to include racial and sexual minorities. He is a 2019 scholar of the NIH-NHLBI Programs to Increase Diversity Among Individuals Engaged in Health-Related Research (PRIDE) - Impact of Ancestry and Gender on Omics of Lung Diseases (AGOLD) program. His memberships in ACE include the Minority Affairs Committee (MAC) and Career Mentoring Committees. Yelena (Lena) Gorina, MPH, MS, is a statistician/epidemiologist at the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC). Her work includes methodological and epidemiological studies, such as disparities in cancer screening among older women and co-morbid conditions for deaths from COVID-19. She served on the Epi Team during her five deployments for the Ebola epidemic response in Sierra Leone as a government employee (civilian), was deployed to Kyrgyzstan and Kazakhstan on the World Health Organization (WHO) Stop Transmission of Polio (STOP) assignment, and served on the response teams during H1N1 and SARS outbreaks.

Unbeknownst to both, Rob and Lena discovered they were both deployed in Kyrgyzstan during the same time and currently reside near one another when Lena visits her summer home in Virginia Beach. To accomplish the goals of the ACE Career Mentoring Committee and educate minority undergraduates about the path to professional epidemiology, Rob and Lena have been collaborating with ACE MAC and external public health and career consultants on creating a series of webinars that highlight the careers of minority epidemiologists.

Public Health in Real Life -Career Path to Epidemiology, co-founder Ashwin Kadambi, MS, MPH collaborated with Rob and Lena to produce an hour-long session on the unique career of a Public Service Officer, Dr. Monique Foster, MD, MPH, an EVMS medical school alumnus. Ashwin is Rob's former student and advisee. Dr. Foster provided her public health experiences as a medical doctor and epidemiologist with the US Public Health Service, NIH and CDC. Fellow MAC member, Dr. Erik Rodriquez, was also interviewed in another episode of Public Health in Real Life to provide students the pros and cons of his public health career as a federal employee.

The other external collaboration was Ms. Valarie Austin, a West Point graduate, retired Army officer, author and President of Vauboix Publishing, LLC. Valarie developed a two-part Epidemiology career series with Rob designed to introduce high school students to the field of epidemiology.

KEY POINTS FROM THE 2022 ANNUAL MEETING









1. In our first in-person conference since 2019, we hosted over 100 attendees in person and many more online using our hybrid conference platform. Many of our online attendees were international scholars and students.







2. Long-time ACE member and founding Director of the Center for the Study of Racism, Social Justice & Health, Dr. Chandra Ford, kicked off the meeting with a talk about critical race theory, COVID-19, and conspiracies. She gave our members a call to action to study and name racism, not race, as a key contributor to poor health.



3. Famed author and bird photographer, Dr. Carl Bergstorm from the University of Washington, gave an illuminating presentation on the growth of misinformation and infoepidmics. Bergstrom is the author of "Calling Bullshit." We gave away 4 signed copies of his book and auctioned one off at the Epidemiology Foundation reception.







4. Dr. Yonaira Rivera, Assistant Professor of Communications at Rutgers University, spoke as part of a panel on building trust in diverse communities, a key to combatting misinformation and rebuilding trust where it's been broken. Leveraging the expertise of scholars from other disciplines was a key feature of this year's event.







ETHICS COMMITTEE UPDATE - COLLABORATIONS IN ACTION

As epidemiologists, we collaborate with those in other disciplines (from computer and social scientists to stakeholders and partners in our communities). Our work is enriched when we share our expertise and lived experiences.

Since assuming the role of the Ethics Committee Chair two years ago, I have worked on synergizing cross-committee collaborations within ACE. The Communication, Membership, and Policy Committee leaders have attended the Ethics Committee's meetings and graciously shared their experiences, activities, and accomplishments. We will continue to pursue and expand this activity with other committees within ACE in the coming years.

I also want to highlight another endeavor we successfully implemented as part of the 2022 ACE Annual Meeting - inter-organizational collaborations. The Ethics Committee sponsored two panels jointly with the International Epidemiological Association (IEA) and the American Medical Informatics Association (AMIA) this year. Past President Eberth and the Capital Hills Management staff made both panel discussions accessible to in-person and virtual attendees.

For the ACE-IEA panel, we were privileged to hear from two fellows and former ACE leaders (Douglas Weed and John Acquavella) and the current IEA president (Chandra Pandey) on global matters of epidemiology and ethics. For the ACE-AMIA panel, two ACE and ACMI (American College of Medical Informatic) fellows (John Holmes and Ken Goodman) were instrumental in recruiting two experts from Indiana University (Brian Dixon, ACMI fellow) and Washington University (Randi Foraker, AMIA member). This panel focused on the emerging field of computational epidemiology and its merits, pitfalls, and ethics.

According to the Bureau of Labor Statistics 8,600 epidemiologists were employed in the United States in 2021, but the demand for epidemiologists is only growing. In fact, the job outlook for epidemiologists through 2031 is expected to grow at a rate of 26%, far outpacing the average growth rate for all occupations, which is only 5%.

XINZHI ZHANG, MD, PHD, FACE
AWARDS COMMITTEE CHAIR, AMERICAN COLLEGE OF EPIDEMIOLOGY



Congratulations to Dr. Jiang He, MD, PhD on being selected as the 2022 recipient of the American College of Epidemiology's (ACE) Abraham Lilienfeld Award. The College's most prestigious award is given in honor of Dr. Abraham Lilienfeld, MD, MPH an outstanding teacher, scholar, and a founder of the ACE. Dr. Jiang is a Professor and the Joseph S. Copes, M.D. Chair of Epidemiology at Tulane University School of Public Health and Tropical Medicine and the founding director of the Tulane University Translational Science Institute. For over three decades, he has committed himself to advancing science, clinical medicine, and public health through research, teaching, and academic service. Dr. Jiang's research has made an immense impact on the prevention and control of hypertension worldwide. He has trained more than 100 MPH/MS students and mentored more than 50 doctoral students and post-doctoral fellows.



Congratulations to Dr. John Violanti, PhD on being selected as the 2022 recipient of the American College of Epidemiology's Outstanding Contributions to Epidemiology Award. This award recognizes an active epidemiologist for outstanding contributions to the field. As a Research Professor in the Department of Epidemiology and Environmental Health at the University at Buffalo School of Public Health and Health Professions, Dr. Violanti has devoted his efforts to the management of stress and suicide prevention in police officers and other first responders. By calling attention to the stresses inherent in the job, he identifies strategies for management and prevention that saves lives.



Congratulations to Dr. Hailey Banack, PhD from Dalla Lana School of Public Health at the University of Toronto on being selected as the 2022 recipient of the American College of Epidemiology's Early Career Epidemiologist Award. This award recognizes an early career epidemiologist for contributions to the field in one of three areas: 1) methods development; 2) etiologic research; or 3) applied epidemiology. Dr. Banack is an exceptionally talented early-career epidemiologist who has made substantial contributions to the field with her work on bias analysis, epidemiologic methods, and obesity research. She is committed to broader educational initiatives and launched an innovative podcast specifically devoted to discussing epidemiologic methods and using the podcast as a unique educational forum to dig into challenging epidemiologic methods and design issues.



Congratulations to Ms. Kaitlyn Berry, MPH, PhD Candidate in Epidemiology from the University of Minnesota School of Public Health on being selected as the 2022 recipient of the American College of Epidemiology's Annual Student Paper Prize for her paper entitled, "Impact of Smoking Cessation on Household Food Security". Ms. Berry's present study found that households' risk of future food insecurity decreases after a household member quits tobacco. Given that food insecurity is a persistent public health issue in the US, this work suggests a novel approach for protecting vulnerable households from food insecurity – promoting greater access to tobacco cessation resources.
