As an epidemiologist, I have enjoyed a varied and stimulating career: I started focusing on cancer epidemiology and occupational exposures in Italy, moved to the USA and pursued a doctoral degree in a School of Public Health, broadened my research interests to reproductive health, successfully pursued an academic career at UAB where I continued my research and taught methods, then moved to the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention where I led a branch focusing on surveillance and research on women's health. My training is in environmental and chronic disease epidemiology, specifically exposure to common environmental pollutants and intermediate cardiovascular disease outcomes among children and youth in both the

US and China. I am an investigator on the NIH ECHO (Environmental influences on Child Health Outcomes)
Program, and former Chair of the Illinois Public Health
Association Epidemiology and Health Statistics Section. I am also active in program evaluation for statewide CDC-funded programs and am passionate about collaborating with public health practitioners at the state and local levels on applied research projects.

As a newly tenured faculty member at a large state university, I have benefited tremendously from the intimate networking ACE provides, not just at the annual meeting, but through other ACE programs that you can engage in from your home base! For example, I've gained SO much from the ACE Mentoring Program.
